State Immunization Requirements & Compliance Options

Colorado State Law requires all college or university students enrolled in one or more credit hour(s) to comply with Colorado Board of Health Rule (6 CCR 1009-2). This includes graduate students and students who are auditing classes but does **not** include persons enrolled in an online education subplan.

Requirement for students born AFTER January 1, 1957*

Provide proof of having received:

Two (2) valid doses of combined MMR vaccine (combined measles/mumps/rubella vaccine)



Provide proof of having received:

Two (2) valid doses of measles vaccine
Two (2) valid doses of mumps vaccine
Two (2) valid doses of rubella vaccine

***This is a one-time requirement requirement prior to school entry for those not enrolled in an online sub-plan.**

Requirement for students born BEFORE January 1, 1957

See instructions and required paperwork at the top of page 2.

Note: If students transfer from one Auraria institution to another Auraria institution there is no need to resubmit immunization records. However, students must notify the Auraria Immunization Office of this transfer to prevent an immunization hold from being placed on their student account at the new institution.

Instructions for Students Born:

AFTER JANUARY 1, 1957

Complete Step 1 of the Auraria Immunization Compliance Form and provide one of the following:

- Attach a copy of your immunization records showing proof of two (2) doses of combined MMR vaccine OR proof of two (2) doses of measles vaccine, two (2) doses of mumps vaccine and two (2) doses of rubella vaccine, OR
- Have your Health Care Provider complete Step 2 on the compliance form, OR
- Attach a copy of your blood titer test results (see Option 1 below)

BEFORE JANUARY 1, 1957

Students must ONLY complete Step 1 of the Auraria Immunization Compliance Form.

These students have presumptive immunity to measles, mumps, and rubella as majority of people born before 1957 are likely to have been infected naturally.

IMMUNIZATION DEADLINES

Colorado immunization law requires students to submit proof of immunization or a Certificate of Medical or Nonmedical Exemption **prior to the first day of classes.**

MEDICAL AND NONMEDICAL EXEMPTION INFORMATION

Colorado law C.R.S. § 25-4-902 requires all students attending any school in the state of Colorado to be vaccinated against certain vaccine-preventable diseases as established by Colorado Board of Health rule 6 CCR 1009-2, unless an exemption is filed. **IN THE EVENT OF AN OUTBREAK, outbreak, students with an exemption on file may be kept off of The Auraria Campus. The length of time will vary depending on the type of disease and the circumstances of the outbreak. Additionally, applicable institutional policies related to forfeiture of tuition and fees may apply.**

To submit a **CERTIFICATE OF MEDICAL EXEMPTION**, download, print and have your Health Care Provider complete the official Certificate of Medical Exemption found at colorado.gov/pacific/cdphe/vaccine-exemptions

The completed Certificate of Medical Exemption can then be submitted with the Auraria Campus Immunization Compliance Form.

Students have two options when submitting a **CERTIFICATE OF NONMEDICAL EXEMPTION**. Either document is to be submitted with the Auraria Campus Immunization Compliance Form.

OPTION #1

A current "Certificate of Nonmedical Exemption" can be downloaded from CDPHE's Vaccine Exemption page at cdphe.colorado.gov/vaccine-exemptions. The document is to be completed by the parent or student (18 years of age or older) and signed by an immunizing health care provider practicing in Colorado.

OPTION #2

The Online Immunization Education Module is accessed on the Vaccine Exemption page at cdphe.colorado.gov/vaccine-exemptions. At the end of the module review, students 18 years of age or older (or parent/guardian for students under 18 years of age) will complete a fillable electronic form. The Certificate produced from successfully reviewing the Module does not require a signature from an immunizing health care provider.

Can't Find Your Shot Records?

Option 1: Blood Titer Individuals who cannot find their shot records, but know that they were fully vaccinated or had all three diseases, have the option to provide evidence of positive immunity by having their blood drawn for a "blood titer test" which can document positive immunity to measles, mumps and rubella. Please complete the Auraria Immunization Compliance Form and attach a copy of the results of the blood titer lab report. Only quantitative titers showing numerical values indicating degree of immunity will be accepted. The Auraria Immunizations Office can perform blood titer testing.

Option 2: Re-Immunization Students can choose to be re-immunized by a community medical provider or by the Auraria Immunization Office located in Plaza Building, Suite 150, which offers reduced cost MMR vaccinations.

Auraria Campus Immunization Requirements & State of Colorado Law

Requirement: Students must submit proof of valid **measles/mumps/rubella (MMR)** vaccinations or evidence of immunity. Exemptions are permitted by State law, but may have implications for class attendance, tuition, and fees in the case of an outbreak.

Complete Steps 1-3* and Read the Public Health Alert on the Opposite Side

Submit immediately to avoid having a HOLD placed on your student account

**Students born before January 1, 1957 are presumed to have natural immunity to measles, mumps, and rubella and are not required to show proof of immunity. In this case, only complete step 1 (skip step 2) and submit as outlined in step 3.*

Colorado law, Section 23-5-128, C.R.S., requires all public or nonpublic postsecondary education institutions in Colorado to provide information concerning meningococcal disease and meningococcal vaccine to each new college or university student residing in student housing, or to the college or university student's parent or legal guardian if the college student is under 18 years.

Meningococcal disease is a serious disease and refers to any illness caused by bacteria *Neisseria meningitidis*. These illnesses are often severe, can be deadly, and include infections of the lining of the brain and spinal cord (meningitis) and sometimes the bloodstream.

Meningococcal disease is contagious, but largely preventable. Keeping up to date with recommended vaccines is one of the best ways to protect against meningococcal disease.

Even when treated with appropriate antibiotic therapy, meningococcal disease kills 10 to 15 out of 100 people who are infected.

As many as 20% of survivors will have permanent conditions such as hearing loss, brain damage, kidney damage, amputations, nervous system problems, and scarring due to skin grafts.

There are two types of meningococcal vaccines available in the U.S.

MenACWY (vaccine or signed waiver is required)	MenB (not required for school entry)
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can prevent four types of meningococcal disease and is routinely recommended for children and adolescents. - New college students living in residence halls should receive at least one dose of MenACWY within five years prior to college entry. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can prevent serotype B meningococcal disease, which is relatively rare, though outbreaks have occurred at several U.S. colleges. - Health care providers, the student, and/or their parent(s) or guardian(s) should discuss the risk of the disease and weigh the benefits and risks of vaccination.

To get vaccinated against meningococcal disease or to discuss the benefits and risks of vaccination, students should check with their health care provider.

New students living in residence halls who have not received a MenACWY vaccine within five years and who do NOT wish to be vaccinated must check the box and sign below to indicate they have reviewed this information in regards to obtaining a vaccine for protection against meningococcal disease. NOTE: Parents/guardians must sign if their student is under 18 years of age.

- ☐ Check to indicate that you have obtained the MenACWY vaccine that prevents against meningococcal disease within the past five (5) years and have attached proof of immunization.
- ☐ Check to indicate you have reviewed the information on meningococcal disease and have decided not to obtain the MenACWY vaccine that protects against meningococcal disease.
